The Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992

The regulations state: to avoid Manual Handling activities where it is reasonable and practicable to do so, and ,where it is not, to assess the risks and take appropriate steps to reduce it so far as reasonable practicable

What are the Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992? Manual handling regulations in the UK include the Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992, or MHOR (as amended in 2002). Other more general laws like the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 may apply to manual handling, but MHOR is the only specific UK regulation.

Manual handling legislation. The Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992 place responsibilities on employers to implement control measures to minimise the risks involved with manual handling. Schools must ensure all reasonable precautions are taken to provide and maintain safe working conditions, and that staff have the knowledge required to undertake manual handling tasks safely.
